Beachy Head East

Recommended Marine Conservation Zone (MCZ)





Fact file

This area is characterised by Sovereign Shoals, an extensive wildlife-rich sandstone reef with outcrops of chalk. Peat and clay exposures are also found here. Marine life here includes a variety of sponges, anemones, native oysters and seahorses. Soft corals colonise the underside of slab surfaces together with tube worms.

Animal 'reefs', known as biogenic reefs, occur here and this site provides one of the best regional examples of mussel beds. Biogenic reef structures made by mussels and ross worms provide homes for a diversity of marine life which would otherwise not be present on the seafloor.

Fish found here include short-snouted seahorses, colourful cuckoo wrasse and this is also one of the most important nearshore nursery areas for plaice and Dover sole. Black-headed gulls, black-legged kittiwakes and common terns all come here to feed.
